

Choose an Aged Care Home: Considering Star Ratings

What are Star Ratings?

Aged care homes receive a Star Rating between 1 (significant improvement needed) and 5 stars (excellent care). The ratings are based on 4 key areas:

- Residents' experience
- Compliance
- Staffing
- Quality measures

Which aged care homes tend to receive higher Star Ratings?

The Registry of Senior Australians Research Centre (ROSA) evaluated almost 2,500 aged care homes nationally from publicly available data and here's what they learnt:

- Over half of aged care homes received a 4 or 5 star rating between April and June 2023.
- Only 2% of aged care homes received a rating of 1 or 2 stars.
- Aged care homes with a 4 or 5 star rating tended to be:
 - Small (60 or fewer residents) or medium-sized (61-100 residents)
 - Government-operated
 - Located in wealthier areas

How have Star Ratings changed over time?

The study found that:

- Improvements in star ratings were common, although some aged care homes experienced declines. One in four aged care homes increased their Star Rating, while one in ten decreased.

- Ratings for key areas such as residents' experience, compliance, staffing, and quality measures fluctuated over time.

How to use this information

When researching aged care homes, use the Star Ratings as a starting point, and:

- Compare individual categories: Look beyond the overall star rating and consider the ratings in each key area (residents' experience, staffing, compliance, and quality

measures). This will give you a more complete picture of care quality.

- **Check for improvements:** Review the overall star rating history for aged care homes to see how their ratings may have changed over time.
- **Consider other characteristics:** In addition to Star Ratings, factors such as the aged care home's size, ownership type (government, for-profit, or not-for-profit) and where it is located may also influence the care provided.
